Family & friend caregivers give care. Care providers provide care.


We use this language because it helps clarify each person's role and their relationship to the person receiving care.

We surveyed 228 caregivers and found that over

85% prefer the term caregiver or family/friend caregiver to describe their role.




According to an Institute for Work and Health study:

- Women compared to men are 73% more likely to permanently leave work to care for an older relative
- Between 1997-2012, the number of workers who permanently left work or changed to part-time work to care for an older relative increased from 3,300 to nearly 15,000
